**RESEARCH RESOURCES:**

*Tertiary sources* include bibliographies, indexes, and other reference resources that point you to other sources.

*Secondary sources* are those that analyze, assess, or interpret a topic under investigation, typically utilizing primary sources to do so.

*Primary sources* (adapted from definitions on web sites at Yale University library and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill library): Primary sources are firsthand testimony or direct evidence concerning a topic under investigation. The nature and value of a source cannot be determined without reference to the topic and questions it is meant to answer. Primary sources are first-hand accounts of events and experiences, both public and personal. These accounts are recorded in a variety of formats, both published and unpublished. Newspapers are examples of published primary sources. Letters, diaries, photographs, and field recordings are examples of unpublished primary sources. These "remains of the day" - what has survived and been preserved - illuminate a past we would not otherwise know. They allow researchers to eavesdrop on the past and in a sense to travel back in time by telling the stories of a past witnessed or experienced by the records' creators. Historians use primary sources to reconstruct and interpret the past, and thus primary sources are the "raw materials" of history.

Primary sources originate from different points in time. Some sources such as letters from the battlefield, photographs, and daily diaries are created close to the time of the experience. Others are recorded

Library staff collected the materials between 1966 and 1995. Most of the organizations whose literature is featured in this collection were not UCI-based groups. Rather, the bulk of the literature was produced by larger local and national organizations. Some of the more prolific contributing groups include: United Farm Workers, Vietnam Veterans Against the War, Farmworkers Support Committee of Orange County, Californians for McGovern, and Campuses United Against Apartheid.

The posters advertise programs and events held on the campus and provide information on course offerings as well as academic and student support services. The sample of posters shown in class promote events organized by a variety of student organizations, as well as lectures and conferences related to Chicano/Latino Studies.

Notes: This collection comprises flyers, reports, newsletters, photographs, bumper stickers, and ephemera compiled for use at the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee (UFWOC) Information Fair held in San Fernando, California in 1969. The collection is particularly strong in documenting the United Farm Workers (UFW) trade union and its formation; UFW-organized boycotts and strikes, including the Delano Grape Strike from 1965 to 1966; and the working and living conditions of migrant agricultural laborers. Other files document the economic and legal aspects of farm labor; ties between churches and the farm labor movement; and the effect of pesticides on farm laborers. 20 photographs by unidentified

photographers depict UFW founder and president Cesar Chavez, and others at rallies; agricultural laborers at work, including child laborers; migrant camps; and medical and dental clinics for laborers.

Notes: This collection comprises an album of 66 studio photographs, cartes de visite, and tintypes of early and prominent Californio family members. The families are predominantly from the Orange County area and include the prolific and prominent Yorbas, Peraltas, and Sepulvedas, the first three land grant families that received titles for areas which include the present day UC Irvine campus from King Ferdinand VII of Spain in the early 19th century. Also included are portraits of members from the Avilas, Burruel, Dryden, Gless, Landell, Lugos, Pryor, and Ríos families. Individual and group portraits of adults predominate, although there are a number of child and infant portraits. Also of interest are photographs of a wedding party; Soledad Pryor Landell and Peregrina Yorba bridal portraits, and an unidentified priest. Several of the 17 tintypes are hand-colored.
